Dear Murdock Members,

Amid New England's colorful foliage in October 2024, join Curator **Dr. Tera Hedrick** and me on an unforgettable five-night journey in Hartford and Boston. Both founded by Puritan settlers in the 1630s, these cities hold much of America's cultural heritage. On this behind-the-scenes program, savor guided looks at cherished private collections, director-led tours of acclaimed museums when they're closed to the public, and exclusive receptions in memorable venues.

In Hartford, go behind the scenes at some of America's earliest museums. Begin with a private tour and reception at the oldest continually operating U.S. public art museum, the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art, which opened in 1844. Take a private look at the nearby New Britain Museum of American Art, the first U.S. museum dedicated to American art, featuring works by Church, Cassatt, Hartley, and other masters. Later, the director of the Hill-Stead Museum will guide us through its superb Impressionist art collection housed in a Colonial Revival mansion designed by pioneering female architect Theodate Pope Riddle.

Venture to Boston for a four-night stay. Gather for an inside look at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, which was designed as a Renaissance *palazzo* and displays breathtaking art collected from around the world. At the vast Museum of Fine Arts, join a curator to see varied masterworks by artists ranging from Velázquez and Van Gogh to Pollock and Picasso. In Cambridge, a curator at Harvard's Fogg Museum will open its doors before hours and introduce us to its diverse collection.

For a change of pace, enjoy an inside look at the Museum of Bad Art, a quirky space challenging traditional notions of "good art." On a private tour at the National Center for Afro-American Artists, uncover the remarkable yet unsung accomplishments of Black artists like Jacob Lawrence and Romare Bearden. During an excursion to historic Salem, a curator at the Peabody Essex Museum will show us its world-renowned collections, including the fascinating ongoing exhibition *Anila Quayyum Agha: All the Flowers Are for Me*, a luminous sculptural installation from a Pakistan-born artist whose work will be featured in a 2025 WAM exhibition.

We hope you join us for this exclusive journey into New England's cultural richness and diversity against a stunning backdrop of autumn foliage.

ATTEND an exclusive reception at America's oldest continually operating public art museum, Hartford's Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art, with a private tour of its treasures by Caravaggio, Monet, and Renoir

EXPLORE Harvard University's Fogg Museum before opening hours with a curator, savoring diverse works including paintings by Pieter Bruegel the Elder, Rubens, and Rembrandt

GO behind the scenes at the New Britain Museum of American Art, the country's first museum solely dedicated to American art, featuring works by Frederic Edwin Church, Marsden Hartley, Mary Cassatt, John Singer Sargent, and others

MINGLE with fellow travelers at elegant private receptions at special venues in these spectacular colonial cities

ACCOMPANY distinguished art collectors behind the scenes of their lovingly assembled gatherings of cherished treasures

EMBARK on a morning private visit to Boston's vast Museum of Fine Arts (MFA), where you will discover a selection of masterpieces by the likes of Manet, Gauguin, Van Gogh, Kahlo, and Picasso

TAKE an inside look at the marvelous National Center for Afro-American Artists, featuring masterworks by artists including Jacob Lawrence, Romare Bearden, and Elizabeth Catlett

VENTURE to historic Salem for a private tour of the Peabody Essex Museum, featuring an inside look at *Anila Quayyum Agha: All the Flowers Are for Me*, a beautiful sculptural installation from a Pakistan-born artist whose work will be showcased at a 2025 WAM exhibition

DISCOVER one of the country's most fascinating and irreverent art spaces, Boston's Museum of Bad Art, featuring a lighthearted exploration of creativity beyond traditional standards



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MONDAY, OCTOBER 14: ARRIVAL IN HARTFORD, CONNECTICUT

After arrival at Hartford's Bradley International Airport, transfer independently to the hotel. Later, enjoy a reception and private visit at the Wadsworth Atheneum Museum of Art in downtown Hartford. Founded in 1842 and opened to the public in 1844, this castle-like museum is the oldest continually operating U.S. public art museum.

Away from the crowds, explore the Wadsworth's remarkable and varied collections, including Baroque paintings by Caravaggio, Gentileschi, and Strozzi; Impressionist paintings by Monet and Renoir; Surrealist works by Dalí, Miró, Ernst, and Magritte; and American masterpieces by Hartley, O'Keeffe, and Andrew Wyeth. Afterwards, gather for dinner.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 15: HARTFORD / NEW BRITAIN / FARMINGTON / BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS

In the nearby town of New Britain, visit the New Britain Museum of American Art, the first U.S. museum solely dedicated to American art. Founded in 1903, it features an extensive collection of paintings, sculptures, photography, decorative arts, and more, showcasing prominent artists like Frederic Edwin Church, Marsden Hartley, Mary Cassatt, John Singer Sargent, and others.

After lunch, venture to the town of Farmington for a special, director-led visit to the Hill-Stead Museum, originally designed as a family country estate by Theodate Pope Riddle (1867–1946), one of the first licensed female architects in the U.S. Surrounded by 152 acres of gardens and grounds, Hill-Stead has been called "perhaps the finest Colonial Revival house and museum in the United States" in the National Historic Landmark Report.

Discover the Hill-Stead Museum's splendid collection of Impressionist masterpieces from the likes of Mary Cassatt, Edgar Degas, Édouard Manet, and Claude Monet. You may also peruse its diverse print collection spanning four centuries, featuring works by Albrecht Dürer, Giovanni Battista Piranesi, Jean-François Millet, and Japanese woodblock virtuosos Hokusai, Hiroshige, and Utamaro.

Later, travel to Boston for your four-night stay at the Lenox Hotel (or similar), with dinner at leisure.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 16: BOSTON

Enjoy a special morning visit to the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston (MFA), one of the world's largest museums, with more than 100 galleries housed in a grand neoclassical building. The museum's vast, comprehensive collections span history and geography, including works by renowned artists such as Tintoretto, Donatello, Velázquez, Rembrandt, Monet, Manet, Gauguin, Van Gogh, Messerschmidt, Rodin, Copley, Homer, Kahlo, Sargent, Pollock, and Picasso.

Later this afternoon, join an expert guide at the intimate Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, known for its distinctive collection and especially its breathtakingly beautiful setting. Designed to resemble a 15th-century Venetian Renaissance palazzo, the building itself is an architectural masterpiece, featuring lush gardens, cloisters, and interior spaces that evoke a sense of elegance and tranquility.

After a famous 1990 heist at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, empty frames remain in place to remind visitors of the stolen treasures. Yet the treasures you will see are spectacular, from paintings by Titian, Botticelli, and Sargent to furniture, silver, ceramics, and other objects from around the world.

Gather for dinner this evening after viewing a wonderful private collection. B,L,D





FRIDAY, OCTOBER 18: SALEM / BOSTON

Travel to historic Salem, Massachusetts, for a private morning visit to the Peabody Essex Museum (PEM), one of the U.S.'s oldest continuously operating museums. Take an inside look at their ongoing exhibition *Anila Quayyum Agha: All the Flowers Are for Me*, a sculptural chamber of light and shadow suspended from the ceiling. The Lahore, Pakistanborn, U.S.-based Agha drew inspiration from Persian and Turkish architecture, textiles, and miniature paintings for this mesmerizing installation. Notably, the works of Agha will be featured in a 2025 WAM exhibition.

Following lunch this afternoon, take a guided tour of Salem with a local expert. Stop into some of Salem's historic and infamous locales related to its illustrious yet checkered past. On the way back to Boston, stop for a visit to a private collection. This evening, celebrate our journey together during a festive farewell dinner at a private venue.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 19: BOSTON / RETURN

Transfer to Boston Logan Airport for your flights home.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 17: CAMBRIDGE / BOSTON

Cross the Charles River to Harvard University's campus in Cambridge. Here, enjoy a special before-hours visit to the Fogg Museum, Harvard's oldest museum, in the company of a curator. Inside this Italian Renaissance-style complex designed by Richard Morris Hunt with a glass atrium designed by Renzo Piano, explore the Fogg Musem's diverse paintings, some dating to the Middle Ages. View exceptional works by Pieter Bruegel the Elder, Rubens, Rembrandt, and other masters alongside an extensive collection of Italian Renaissance and British art.

What is "bad art"? After lunch, discover the unconventional perspective of the Museum of Bad Art, a thought-provoking space that has been featured in the New York Times and even used in academic studies. This museum curates artworks that may not align with traditional artistic standards yet possess amusing qualities. The exhibits feature paintings, sculptures, and other visual art forms with unusual proportions or color choices, among other quirks, offering a lighthearted exploration of creativity and individual expression beyond standard notions of "good" or "bad" art.

Later, take a private tour of the National Center for Afro-American Artists (NCAAA), founded in 1968 by Elma Lewis, a respected Bostonian figure known for her dedication to providing arts and cultural opportunities to young people of color. Discover its wide-ranging collection of more than 3,000 pieces created by African-American artists as well as artists from the broader African diaspora. Highlights include works by Jacob Lawrence, Romare Bearden, and Elizabeth Catlett as well as narrative paintings by Allan Crite, New England's acclaimed "Dean of African-American Artists."

Gather for a special reception at a private venue this evening, including cocktails and a viewing of a private collection.

Dinner is at leisure.
